



What does success look like?

Level 1 Demerit

An explanation regarding the difficulties that a staff member is having with specific behaviour is given to a student.

Level 2 Demerit

Additional class work may be given to make up for the disruption that the student may have caused.

Level 3 Demerit

If the behaviour persists then Demerits will be issued. The student is always informed that demerits have been issued and the staff member will amend the students record on VSware.

Level 4 Demerit

The Form Tutor will work with the student and staff to support good behaviour. This may take the form of conversations or guidance as to how to deal with the specific relationships.

Level 5 Demerit

The Form Tutor may recommend Detention for specific behaviours or breaches of the policy.



Level 6 Demerit

The Form tutor passes the student to the Year Head or Pastoral Care Team for additional support. This may take the form of report cards, support services or conversations with parents.

Level 7 Demerit

The Year Head may recommend suspension for the student after all avenues have been exhausted.

Level 8 Demerit

This is the penultimate step for the student and involves a Behavioural Contract with the parent/guardian and the school. This is tailored to the specific needs of the student.

Level 9 Demerit

If every effort has been exhausted then the Exclusion process will commence.

— Level 1 Merit

Students with more than 10 merits per term go into a draw for a prize. This may be canteen or phone credit.



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Level 2 Merit

Prior to Christmas, the student with the highest number of merits will receive a prize at assembly.



Level 3 Merit

Collective merits for each river will be calculated and the river with the most merits will receive Cup points.



Level 4 Merit

The student with the most merits for the year will receive the Merit Cup at Prize Night which will be given in recognition of their continued epitome of the Relationship and Behaviour Policy







TY Digital Learning Leaders gain experience and opportunities to develop these five exemplary leadership skills by facilitating digital learning workshops. 
Milly, you have the final word, would you like to share some advice/tips for potential school leaders?




President of Ireland, aimed at 14-25-year-olds across the country. There are different levels for the award (Bronze, Silver and Gold).

The participant is required to complete an hour a week, for a set number of weeks, for three different challenge areas and an overnight hike.

The first challenge area is a physical skill, for example some people in our class chose basketball, dance, soccer or kickboxing. The next challenge area is a personal skill e.g., baking/cooking, learning a new language or instrument or improving a skill you already have. The final challenge area is community involvement e.g., assisting coaching, volunteering, litter picking...We have just completed our bronze level of Gaisce and a few people in the class are planning to go on to do the silver award. The overnight hike was our favourite part of the Gaisce experience.





This year for the hike, we walked along the Wicklow Way and stayed the night in a hostel in Glendalough.


Mr O'Loughlin's Junk Kouture students made a big splash in the competition with two amazing dresses being designed.
